STEP 1: Find a Subject

- All articles must be originally published in ENGLISH and in Peer reviewed Journals, with an Impact Factor
- Use your digital research tools





STEP 2: Find Research Articles

STEP 3: Create your Visual and Oral Presentation Organisation

All presentations should follow the organisation below:

• Section 1: Introduction to the topic

- Section 2: Body
 - Article Review 1
 - Article Review 2
- Section 3: Conclusion and a look at the bigger picture

STEP 3: Create your Visual and Oral Presentation

Section 1 - Introduction - Guiding questions

Your introduction should include information regarding your chosen subject. Following are questions to assist you in understanding the type of information you should include in "Section 1: Introduction".

NOTE: You are not required to answer every question. You should find an original way to address this information as opposed to just giving a list of answers. These questions are only to help you create your introduction.

- What is the topic you chose?
- Why did you choose this topic?
- Why is this topic important?
- Why is this topic interesting?
- How will you address it? (Organisation and viewpoint of the subject)
- What articles will you use to address the subject?
- Why did you find these articles interesting to your subject?

STEP 3: Create your Visual and Oral Presentation


Section 2: Article Review 1 & 2

Each student will present their article in the following format.

All information must be in your own words.

- Introduction
- Methodology
- Results
- Discussion
- Conclusion
- Your reasoning for choosing this article. Why is it important to your chosen subject?

Remember to *transition* from one section to the next and from one article to the next. Use signpost language to create smooth transitions.



STEP 3: Create your Visual and Oral Presentation

Section 3: Conclusion

Below are a list of guiding questions that will help you create a conclusion that both (1) reminds us of the most important information presented AND (2) helps us understand why it is important.

- What did you learn about your subject?
- Did the articles change the way you understand your topic?
- Do the articles give us critical information that we should retain?
- Why is this research and topic important to psychology?
- What does all of this mean for the future of psychology?
- What effect did this subject have on how we study people/minds/society?
