## **Intonation Patterns**

## **7** Rising intonation:

- Uncertainty, incompleteness → yes/no questions, checking information, unfinished lists/sentences, "there's more to follow".

## **→** Falling intonation:

- Finality, definiteness, completeness → facts, confident statements, conclusions, finished lists, "that's all folks".
